Biographical/Historical note

The Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control was established in 1977. Its purpose was to advise the seven standing committees that had jurisdiction over issues related to drug problems since it was believed that the overlap in jurisdiction had impeded the review of the drug problem as a whole. The committee was not renewed in 1993.

Records are printed hearings and reports, chronological files, meeting files, subject files, bill files, and files of the minority. Some records archived with the 96th Congress are from later congresses.

Conditions Governing Access note

The records are governed by Rule VII(3)b of the House Rules: (b) (1) A record shall immediately be made available if it was previously made available for public use by the House or a committee or a subcommittee. (2) An investigative record that contains personal data relating to a specific living person (the disclosure of which would be an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy), an administrative record

relating to personnel, or a record relating to a hearing that was closed under clause 2(g)(2) of rule XI shall be made available if it has been in existence for 50 years. (3) A record for which a time, schedule, or condition for availability is specified by order of the House shall be made available in accordance with that order. Except as otherwise provided by order of the House, a record of a committee for which a time, schedule, or condition for availability is specified by order of the committee (entered during the Congress in which the record is made or acquired by the committee) shall be made available in accordance with the order of the committee. (4) A record (other than a record referred to in subparagraph (1), (2), or (3)) shall be made available if it has been in existence for 30 years.
